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Economic Review 4th Quarter 2016

- U.S. Equity markets accelerated gains after the election
 - U.S. equity markets had been gaining through the year, then significantly accelerated after the surprise U.S. presidential election results. Investors anticipate higher economic growth, lower taxes, and reduced regulatory environment with the Trump presidency.
 - Markets reached all time highs during the quarter as stocks positively exposed to rising interest rates and pro-cyclical stocks surged.
- Solid economic data also helping drive markets higher
 - 3rd quarter GDP was revised higher to 3.5% growth—the highest in 2 years.
 - November and recently released December employment reports show a continuation of healthy job growth. The unemployment rate ticked higher to 4.7% from an increase in the labor force. Annual wage growth rose to new cyclical highs of 2.9%.
 - Consumer confidence exceeds pre recession levels climbing post election
 - Housing was mixed as contracts to buy existing homes in November fell with the rise in interest rates and limited inventory but new home sales in November rose. Further interest rate gains pose risks for 2017.
- Federal Reserve / Interest rates
 - As expected, the Fed hiked rates by 1/4 point in December in a repeat of last year.
 - With rising inflation expectations interest rates spiked sharply and the yield curve steepened following the election. The 10 year U.S. Treasury yield rose from 1.9% on November 8 to almost 2.5% by year end.
- Energy
 - Oil climbed above \$50/bbl after OPEC agreed to cut production.
- Global concerns
 - The world is intently watching the U.S. as the Trump administration is assembled and begins to outline policy positions.

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Market Performance 4th Quarter 2016

- U.S. equities continued their strong performance
- The S&P 500 gained 3.8% in the quarter and is up 12.0% for the year
- Small cap stocks significantly outperformed large names in the quarter and are well ahead for the year
- Value stocks outperformed growth for the quarter and remain well ahead for the full year in both large and small caps

Sector / Factor Performance

- Financials posted the strongest returns in both small and large caps, driven by the surge in banking stocks.
- In large cap value Health Care, Real Estate and Consumer Staples, all posted negative returns in the quarter.
- Interest rates continued to climb in the 4th quarter, leading higher yielding REITs and Utilities to continue to lag.
- Low price momentum outperformed by a wide margin in both the quarter and year.
- High PE and high PB lagged in large cap value for both the quarter and full year.

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4th Quarter Positives for Relative Returns

REIT's and Utilities

• These higher yielding sectors lagged again this quarter as interest rates continued to move higher. Our large underweight of utilities and no exposure to REIT's benefitted returns during the second half of this year.

Consumer Staples

• A large underweight in one of the weakest sectors for both the quarter and year produced a very positive result for the portfolio. A generally defensive sector the companies lagged during the strong growth and post election rally in the markets.

Consumer Discretionary

• Despite being overweight another weak performing sector, this was one of our best contributors on both an absolute and relative basis from better than benchmark returns in the portfolio holdings.

Financials

• After the election Banks and Capital Markets posted very strong returns as the market anticipates changes to their regulatory environment.

Factors

• Share change and Price momentum for the second quarter in a row were both strong contributors to the overall performance. Avoiding companies with the highest share increases had the largest benefit to the portfolio. Additionally avoiding the highest momentum stocks also helped as it did for the full year.

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4th Quarter Negatives for Relative Returns

Health Care

A large overweight in the worst performing sector for both the quarter and year detracted from returns.
However, better positioning particularly within the Equipment and Suppliers industry helped to buffer some of the impact.

Technology

• In a reversal from the prior quarter, our large overweight hurt returns during the quarter. The sector did manage to still post a slightly positive absolute return for the quarter but substantially lagged many other sectors and did not exhibit any post election strength.

Factors

• In a continuation from last quarter both Quality (return on equity) and Size were headwinds to the portfolio. Higher quality companies continued to lag the rest of the market as did larger companies which underperformed mid and smaller cap stocks during the quarter and for the full year.

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4th Quarter 2016 Portfolio Positioning

Sector Weight Changes

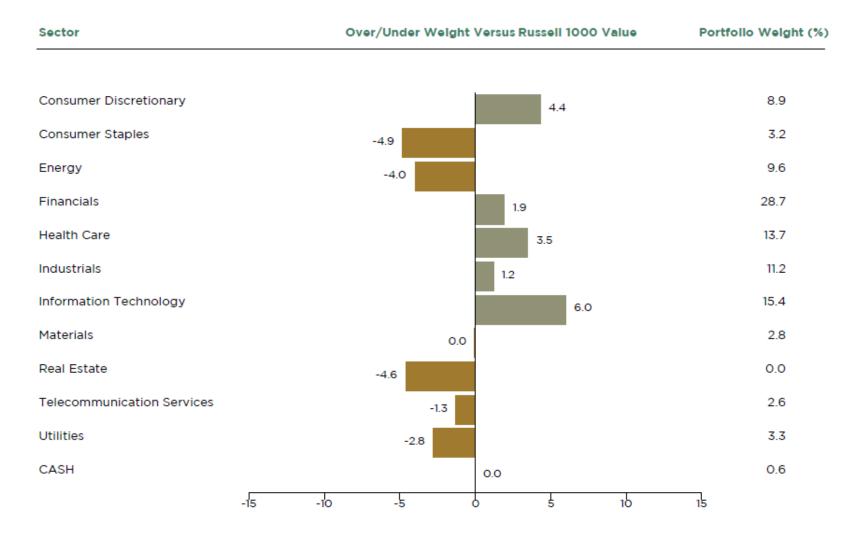
- Our biggest increase on a sector basis was within the Financial sector. The increase was primarily driven from new positions in Banking and reversed the positioning direction from the third quarter. The sector experienced a very strong post election surge which further contributed to the weighting increase.
- Energy increased 1% in the quarter from new positions in Refiners and E & P companies.
- We also increased the overall weight in the Technology sector. Sells within IT Services slightly offset the modest increases in Semiconductors and Communications Equipment manufacturers.
- A combination of low momentum sales and weak returns this quarter resulted in the Consumer Staples sector having the largest decrease in the portfolio. It is now one of our smallest sectors on an absolute basis and our largest underweight relative to the benchmark.
- The Consumer Discretionary sector also had a large decrease from a combination of both valuation and momentum sales.
- Poor performance among Health Care Providers led to a large reduction within the Health Care sector.
- Although the weight change in the Industrials sector was small we did see a sizable rotation within the sector out of Aerospace and Defense companies and into Airlines.
- Portfolio Sector Weights versus Benchmark
 - Technology, Consumer Discretionary and Health Care remain as the three largest overweight sectors.
 - Our largest underweight sectors are Real Estate, Energy and Consumer Staples.
 - Financials, Technology and Health Care are our largest sectors on an absolute basis while Telecom Materials and Consumer Staples are our smallest sectors.
